Lesson and Field Trip Overview

Some of Louisiana's most important and controversial governors guided the state from offices that were located in Louisiana historic Old State Capitol. This classroom project and museum exhibition activity is based on the Old State Capitol's Louisiana Governors and Statehouses of Louisiana Internet exhibitions as well as our new, interactive **Louisiana Governors' Portrait Gallery** museum exhibition, which opened in 2009.

Our pre-visit project introduces students to the governors who served in Louisiana's historic statehouse. Plan a class visit to Louisiana's Old State Capitol Museum of Political History to examine the rooms where these men, as well as Louisiana's elected state officials, made significant and historic decisions. Then, explore the museum's second floor Rotunda to view the state's largest exhibition of gubernatorial portraits and visit our portrait kiosk to learn how each shaped Louisiana history.

Pre-Visit Activity

- 1. Introduce students to Louisiana's Old State Capitol, using our Louisiana's Historic Statehouse Governors history overview and our Internet site, <u>www.sos.la.gov/osc</u>.
- 2. Ask student to complete the Louisiana's Historic Statehouse Governors activity. Explain that they will use our <u>Louisiana Governors</u> and <u>Statehouses of Louisiana</u> Internet exhibitions to find the governors who held office in Louisiana's Old State Capitol building.
- 3. Tell students this pre-visit activity will prepare them for their field trip to Louisiana's Old State Capitol Museum of Political History where they will
 - a. examine the rooms where these men, as well as Louisiana's elected state officials, made significant and historic decisions
 - b. explore the museum's second floor Rotunda to view the state's largest exhibition of gubernatorial portraits
 - c. visit the museum's portrait kiosk to learn how each of the historic statehouse governors shaped Louisiana history

Museum Field Trip

- 1. To prepare for your class' field trip to the Old State Capitol, make copies of the **Louisiana's Historic Statehouse Governors Field Trip Guide,** one copy per student.
- 2. We suggest that you assign student to groups consisting of six to ten students and one chaperone per group. Instruct students to remain with their group during the duration of their visit.
- 3. Explain that students will use their copy of the Louisiana's Historic Statehouse Governors Field Trip Guide to continue their investigation of Louisiana governor and the Old State Capitol.

Post-Visit Activity

Moderate a whole-class discussion to discover what students learned from their field trip, their impressions of the Old State Capitol, and vote for the most interesting portrait in the Governors' Portrait Gallery.

Brief History of the Old State Capitol

Louisiana's historic statehouse, which is known today as the Old State Capitol, served as the seat of Louisiana government for over 60 years. Today, the building houses a modern political history museum with state-of-the-art history exhibitions.

The Old State Capitol building opened for the first time as the seat of Louisiana government in 1850. It was the site of the Louisiana legislature's 1861 vote to secede from the Union and was abandoned by Louisiana's Confederate government in 1862 as Union troops advanced on Baton Rouge. The building was occupied by Union troops during the summer of 1862, months later became a troop hospital following the Battle of Baton Rouge, and was devastated by fire in December of 1862.

The charred structure of the building was abandoned for 20 years until the Louisiana legislature voted to rebuild and reoccupy the historic statehouse. The capitol building reopened in 1862 and served as the seat of government until the construction on Louisiana's New State Capitol was completed in 1932.
